

Knoxville is one of those cities that rewards people who pay attention to the ground under their feet. The city's story is not just written in archives, landmark plaques, and old photographs. It is also carved into ridgelines, river bends, railroad corridors, steep driveways, and the stubborn patchwork of neighborhoods that grew around all of it.
