The Mechanics Behind CS2 Casinos

1. The Steam Web API and Bot Trades

CS2 gambling establishments do not link straight to Valve's servers for financial transactions. Instead, they utilize the Steam Web API to assist in peer-to-peer trades or bot-controlled inventory transfers. When a gamer transfers a skin, a trade offer is sent to a designated automatic bot account.
