- *Cons:* A single crash at 1.00 x will erase the earnings collected from various successful low-multiplier wins.

- **The Martingale System**

- *How it works:* Doubling the bet after every loss, so that a single win recovers all previous losses plus an earnings equal to the original base stake.
- *Pros:* Can yield short-term gains if the gamer has a boundless bankroll.
- *Cons:* Highly harmful. Striking a string of consecutive early crashes (e.g., five 1.00 x crashes in a row) will rapidly tire even a large bankroll or hit optimal bet limits set by the platform.

- **The Moonshot (High Multiplier Chase)**

- *How it works:* Placing small bets and claiming huge multipliers (50x, 100x, or more).
- *Pros:* Extremely high payments for a really small initial threat.
- *Cons:* Statistically rare occasions; the probability of losing the stake is incredibly high.
