Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Small imperfections, small scratches, or minor paint chipping, often just noticeable upon close inspection.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most typical condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and noteworthy paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Extremely used, heavily faded, and sometimes significantly altered appearance. Some collectors specifically look for extreme BS floats for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond standard wear, some skins also include a **StatTrak**™ innovation module, which tracks the variety of kills a gamer gets with that specific weapon, adding a radiant orange digital counter to the body of the weapon.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic items in lots of other modern video games, CS2 skins have real-world monetary value because they are totally tradeable and valuable. Players can buy, offer, and trade products by means of the Steam Community Market or through trusted third-party markets utilizing genuine currency or cryptocurrencies.
