

Westhampton Beach has a way of reminding people that a place is more than a dot on a map. It is a shoreline, yes, but it is also a rhythm, a built environment, and a long accumulation of decisions made by homeowners, shopkeepers, civic leaders, and tradespeople who cared enough to leave something durable behind. A visitor might come for the Atlantic, the village center, or a summer afternoon that seems to last longer than it should.
