Understanding Wear and Tear (Exterior Conditions)

The condition of a skin significantly impacts its look and market price. The wear is divided into 5 distinct exterior categories based on the float value:

Exterior Condition	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with minimal to no scratches or paint chipping. Usually the most expensive.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Very small blemishes or scratches, usually noticeable only upon close evaluation.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible wear, scratches, and fading. This is the most common condition in the game.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear; big portions of the paint may be removed or heavily faded.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Severe wear. The weapon often looks rusted, greatly damaged, or almost totally stripped of paint. (Note: Some particular skins really look much better or "cooler" in Battle-Scarred due to distinct wear patterns).

Rarity Tiers and Grades

Valve categorizes skins into various tiers of rarity, which dictate how regularly they drop in-game or how challenging they are to pull from weapon cases. The standard weapon grades, from most common to rarest, include:

1. **Consumer Grade** (White) - Basic, standard-issue weapons.
2. **Industrial Grade** (Light Blue) - Slightly better than customer grade, still fairly common.
3. **Mil-Spec Grade** (Dark Blue) - The standard for a lot of standard collection drops and lower-tier case products.
4. **Restricted** (Purple) - Uncommon drops, typically including more intricate designs.
5. **Categorized** (Pink) - Rare products that begin including complex artwork and higher market price.
6. **Covert** (Red) - The highest standard weapon tier. These are incredibly uncommon and highly sought after.
7. **Special/ Exceedingly Rare** (Gold) - Knives and wearable gloves. These inhabit the peak of CS: GO skin gathering.

How Are Skins Acquired?

Players have a number of paths to construct their virtual stock, ranging from pure luck to tactical market trading.



- **Random Weekly Drops:** Active gamers who level up their profile receive a care plan enabling them to choose a couple of weekly weapon drops or graffiti items from active map collections.

- **Third-Party Marketplaces:** External websites that permit users to purchase, sell, or trade skins for real-world fiat currency or cryptocurrency, frequently featuring lower charges and cash-out alternatives.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** A mechanic where a player can trade 10 skins of the same quality tier for one random skin of the next higher quality tier.

The Economics and Investment Aspect

What separates CS: GO skins from cosmetics in games like *Fortnite* or *Valorant* is the existence of a **player-driven, free market**. Due to the fact that gamers have real ownership of their items and can trade or sell them freely, skins operate similarly to stocks or products.

Elements that influence a skin's price include:

- **Supply and Demand:** How many exist in blood circulation versus the number of players desire them.
- **Pro Player Usage:** If a famous esports professional utilizes a particular skin during a significant tournament, its rate frequently increases overnight.

- **Case Discontinuation:** When Valve stops dropping a specific case, the supply of those skins becomes limited, typically causing costs to appreciate with time.
- **Pattern and Paint Seed:** Some skins (such as the AK-47 Case Hardened) have various color circulations based upon their "paint seed," where a rare "blue gem" pattern can command tens of countless dollars.

Tips for Beginners Entering the Market
