How a Standard Case Battle Works

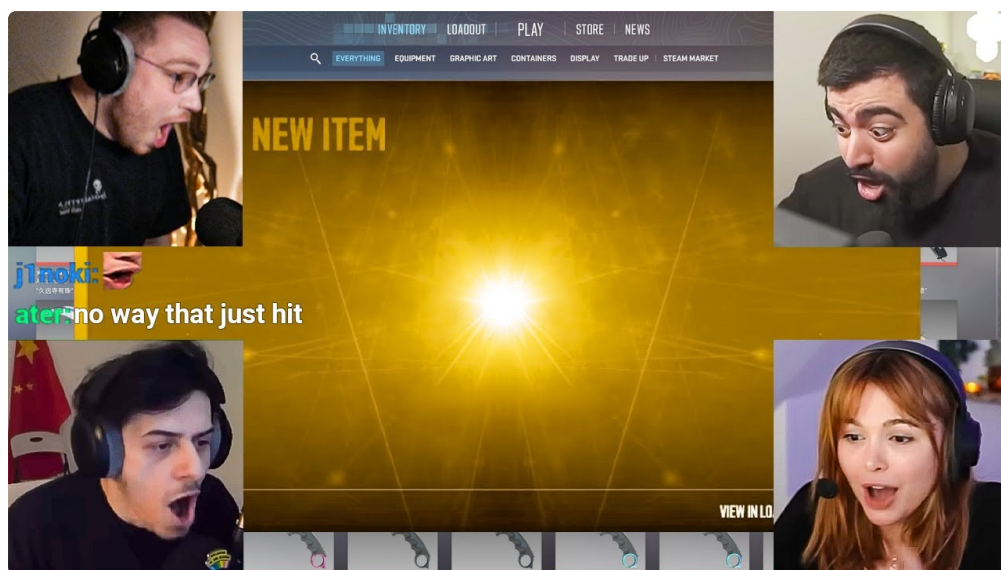
