- **The Martingale System:** A traditional wagering method where a gamer doubles their bet after every loss. The theory is that a single win will recuperate all previous losses plus a profit equal to the initial base bet. However, this needs a massive bankroll and can quickly strike website wagering limitations.
- **The Reverse Martingale (Paroli):** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, attempting to ride a winning streak while keeping losses lessened to the base bet amount.
- **The Moonshot Strategy:** Placing little bets with the intent of claiming enormous multipliers (50x, 100x, or greater). This functions similar to playing the lotto.

Pros and Cons of CS: GO Crash
