Factory New (FN) 0.00-- 0.07 Beautiful, perfect finish with minimal to no scratches.
Very Little Wear (MW) 0.07-- 0.15 Really light wear, usually a few small scuffs on close assessment.
Field-Tested (FT) 0.15-- 0.38 Obvious scratches and use, but the art work stays mostly undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW) 0.38-- 0.45 Substantial wear, heavy scratches, and obvious paint fading.
Battle-Scarred (BS) 0.45-- 1.00 Greatly distressed, rusted, or scraped; often sought after for unique looks.

Beyond outside wear, skins can also possess a **StatTrak**™ module (which tracks confirmed eliminates with that particular weapon, marked by a small digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped throughout official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments, including gold group and event sticker labels).

The CS2 economy functions just like a real-world stock market. Rates are determined entirely by supply and need, rarity, and neighborhood perception.

Why Are Some Skins Worth Thousands of Dollars?

1. **Rarity:** Skins are classified by tiers (Consumer, Industrial, Mil-Spec, Restricted, Classified, Covert, and Special/Exceedingly Rare). The drop rates for high-tier products, specifically knives and gloves, are infinitesimally small.
2. **Trade-Ups:** Players can sell ten skins of a specific tier for one random skin of the next higher tier, burning important products at the same time and decreasing total supply.
3. **Pro Player Influence:** When a well-known esports professional uses a particular skin throughout a significant competition, the cost of that skin typically spikes over night.
4. **Float Extremes:** Some collectors pay huge premiums for items with exceptionally low float worths (e.g., 0.000 x) or incredibly high floats where the gun looks totally rusted away (called "Blackiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

Popular Platforms for Trading and Buying

While players can purchase and sell products directly on the official **Steam Community Market**, funds are locked within the Steam community and can not be squandered to a checking account. As a result, a robust third-party environment has emerged.

- **Steam Community Market:** Safest for casual users; deals use Steam Wallet funds.
- **Third-Party Marketplaces:** Platforms like Skinport, DMarket, and Buff enable users to purchase skins with fiat currency or cryptocurrencies, and often include cash-out alternatives.
- **Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading Sites:** Sites where buyers and sellers trade straight without the bot holding the product for a compulsory trade-hold period.
