- **Local map results reflect actual searches and proximity.** This ensures relevancy for your area and type of injury.

Louisiana's Upcoming Law Changes That Affect Injury Claims

None of these Google rankings can substitute knowing the law. As of July 1, 2024, and beyond, Louisiana will have significant changes that anyone with a personal injury claim in Lafayette must understand:

Louisiana's New Two-Year Prescription Deadline

Previously, Louisiana's prescriptive period (time limit to file suit) for personal injury claims sometimes varied based on facts. Starting **July 1, 2024**, a uniform *two-year prescription* applies. That means you literally have two years from the date of your injury to file a claim in court.

Note: Always ask your lawyer to confirm the "injury date" and write down the deadline during your consultation. Incorrect or vague deadlines are one of the biggest pitfalls for clients.

51% Fault Bar Effective January 1, 2026

Beginning **January 1, 2026**, Louisiana will enforce the “51% fault bar” rule more strictly. This means if you are found to be 51% or more at fault for the accident, you cannot recover damages at all. Prior to this, comparative fault rules allowed partial recovery depending on your percentage of fault.

This change drastically shifts how cases are evaluated. For Lafayette injury lawyers on Google, look for clear explanations about fault apportionment and whether they handle these new nuances.

Paid vs. Billed Medical Expenses Rule for Suits Filed After January 1, 2026

For suits filed on or after January 1, 2026, Louisiana will allow plaintiffs to claim only the actual *paid* medical expenses instead of the usual billed or list prices. This could affect compensation amounts, especially for clients with high medical bills but lower insurance or discounted payments.



Make sure any attorney you consider explains this law change upfront and how it impacts your case value.
