

Bayshore in Miami Beach, Florida, has a way of rewarding people who slow down. It is easy to get distracted by the louder, more familiar version of Miami Beach, the one defined by neon, beach clubs, and the persistent hum of tourist traffic. Bayshore sits a little differently.
