Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

1. Validate the Integrity of Game Files

- Open the **Steam Library**.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

Advanced Troubleshooting

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM offers an efficiency boost, CS: GO is infamously sensitive to hardware instability.

- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
